
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Old Clayburn




Old Clayburn is situated on the eastern edge of the urban area and covers approximately 11 sq km. The area has a mix of land uses including residential, schools and parks, with almost one-third agriculture. The area is largely made up of single-family houses, including hillside development, which as increased significantly in the past few years. Landmarks include MarketPlace IGA, Willband Creek Park, Clayburn Village, and Clayburn Village Store.

The dominant age group of Old Clayburn residents is 10 to 19 years. This is followed by residents 40 to 49 years. Approximately half of Old Clayburn residents have some postsecondary education. The majority of dwellings are owned.







Education & Labour









Immigration by Place of Birth (2001-2006)









Families




The majority of families in Old Clayburn are two-parent with children living at home. Of those families with children living at home, 6 to 14 years is the dominant age group.









MarketPlace IGA

IGA has been serving communities across BC since 1955. The Immel Street location has been serving Abbotsford residents for over 10 years, and is an anchor in the Old Clayburn area. IGA proudly supports local schools and various community events.



Willband Creek Park

Located off Highway 11, the trails at Willband Creek Park are built around stormwater detention ponds and encourage a diverse waterfowl population and various species of migratory birds. These wetland trails border on farmland and provide excellent opportunities for viewing wildlife and enjoying nature.



Clayburn Village

Clayburn Village is a small historic village surrounded by farmland and green fields, on Sumas Mountain's eastern edge. Clayburn was the first company-town in BC, built in the early 1900's to house the workers of Clayburn Company, a clay brick producer. The cottages currently line main street (Clayburn Road).



Clayburn Village Store

Clayburn Village Store was established in 1912. The store is one of a few original buildings left to showcase the historic atmosphere. The store is open five days a week and serves local jams and other products including teas, candy, and baked goods.

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
