Council secures \$76.6M in provincial funding for Barrowtown upgrades

The past three years of advocating for vital flood infrastructure funding by Abbotsford City Council has finally resulted in the Province providing some initial community resilience funding. But more still needs to be done.

On February 14th Mayor Siemens was joined by Premier David Eby, Minister of Emergency Management Bowinn Ma, Minister of Agriculture Pam Alexis and Semá:th Councillor Troy Ganzeveld to announce \$76.6 million in provincial funding to upgrade the Barrowtown Pump Station.

The funds will cover several key improvements to better equip the pump station to withstand severe floodwaters from the nearby Sumas and Nooksack rivers. These include adding a six-metre flood wall, upgrading the debris screens and replacing the pump motors. These upgrades will ensure that the pump is better equipped to protect against flooding and other threats, like debris from the Nooksack and Sumas rivers and power outages in the surrounding

Being able to start this capacity building work is a significant step and we are grateful to the Province for this important investment in our community, in our residents and in our businesses.

Council approves 2022-2026 Strategic Plan Update 🔞 📵 🕋 🗈

On January 30th, City Council approved the updated 2022-2026 Strategic Plan.

The directions identified in the Strategic Plan are the strategic focus for Council and City of Abbotsford staff for the four-year term of City Council 2022-2026. The Strategic Plan is the City's roadmap for the delivery of services, projects and programs. As part of the update for the first year of service delivery, the City Manager advised Council that a number of the priorities identified in the four-year plan have already advanced or been completed.

Completed items include introducing the McKee Neighbourhood Plan and securing funding for the Montrose Transit exchange (which will be completed by the end of the summer 2024), as well as conducting a review of Council Committees. See the plan at abbotsford.ca/strategic.

Official Community Plan Update moves to Stage 2

On January 30th, City Council endorsed the Stage 1 update work completed on the Official Community Plan (OCP) as well as the community engagement strategy, and directed staff to begin work on Stage 2.

The OCP is the City's key municipal planning tool and outlines the long-term vision of our community. It is a statement of objectives and policies that guide decisions on municipal planning and land use management, which impact a community's sustainability and resilience. It was last updated in 2016. Updating the OCP is a priority under Council's 2022-2026 Strategic Plan, and will help to meet Council's direction to "ensure development decisions are based on our long-term strategies and are not swayed from our community vision by short-term goals."

The Province's new housing legislation also prompts OCP changes, and staff's report addressed how the OCP will be in line with those changes as well. Check out letstalkabbotsford.ca/ocp to get involved over the course of the project with engagement opportunities beginning in Spring 2024.


